

What are placement and validation tests?

- PLACEMENT TEST: Given to place students into an appropriate language class. Most languages offer the test online. Some languages require oral and essay writing tests as a part of the placement process.
- VALIDATION TEST: Following the placement test, given to ensure fulfillment of the Weinberg two-year language proficiency requirement (LPR). Validation test often consists of a speaking test, and/or a writing test. Validation may also be requested when the placement test result is not conclusive and needs further assessment.

Who must take the placement test?

In most languages:

- All students with <u>any prior knowledge</u> (formal or informal) of a language other than English. Prior knowledge can come from studying a language in elementary, middle or high school, speaking/being exposed to the language at home, and/or through self-study.
- Heritage language speakers who grew up speaking a language other than English at home, even if they have a very little knowledge of its writing system, must also take the placement test.
- Those who grew up or lived in a country where the language was spoken and have any knowledge of it, and whether they can read or write it, must take the placement test.

Some language programs also place students based on their AP scores; Hindi and Urdu also accept IB scores (see below) for placement purposes.

IMPORTANT: There may be some exceptions to the general policies above. Students should read the instructions posted on each language department website before accessing the online placement test when available, and make sure to follow them carefully.

What to do when a student knows multiple languages?

It is strongly recommended to have them take the placement test in all the languages that they know, starting with the language that they are most confident and comfortable with, and then in the other language(s). If they cannot take the placement test in a second or third language before the set deadlines, students can contact the individual language department to see if they can take the placement test at a later time.

How can a student be placed in a language course and/or have their proficiency validated to satisfy the Weinberg language proficiency requirement?

Placement and proficiency validation procedures vary from language to language. Placement and proficiency validation in individual language courses may based on:

- a) results of the placement test, followed by a validation test
- b) AP language exam scores (not used for Chinese and Japanese)
- c) IB scores (only used for Hindi-Urdu)

Except in cases where students are placed in a language course or have their proficiency validated by **b**) or **c**) above, students must take the placement test first. Afterwards, if their proficiency seems high enough to fulfill Weinberg's two-year language proficiency requirement, they must take the validation test.

IMPORTANT: Some languages require speaking and essay writing tests as a part of the placement process. In such languages, completing the online placement test is not the end of the process. Students should follow the instructions given by the language department as to what to do after submitting the placement test. Students must complete this process promptly in order to get their placement results in a timely manner, and before any registration deadlines.

IMPORTANT: If language proficiency is required for a graduate student, and if the graduate student is planning to enroll in courses at Northwestern, they must take the placement test in that language as soon as they arrive on campus so that the language department can identify an appropriate class or for the graduate student to find out where they are in their language study.
